Justification: This is an elective course in the political science major. Women have only been able to exercise the right to vote in the United States since 1920, and women currently are underrepresented in the elected ranks at all levels of government. Women tend to vote differently than men (the so called "gender gap.") and often have different views on many public policies than do men. Women and Politics is offered as an elective course in most political science programs, there are journals devoted to women and politics, as well as a section of the American Political Science Association on women and politics.
