Justification: Political Theory is an integral subfield of Political Science, providing students with foundational concerns regarding power, justice, the balancing of equality with liberty, and legitimate authority (to name a few). At this point, there is only one Political Theory class in the catalog. POLS 302: Political Theory is intended to be a general, overview class. This proposed course offers theories and theorists not covered in POLS 302 and is a step toward adding classes that cover different time periods and distinct developments in political thought.


