Justification

This course fulfills three units of required lower division Art History for the Art Major. It is also available to the non-art major seeking to fulfill General Education credit in section C1.

This course will introduce the students to the diverse artistic developments of the period. By exposing them to various art historical movements and methodologies this course will allow them to better understand the complexity of art and its history. Moreover, the class discussions, visual presentations, readings, and museum visits will enable students to develop personal aesthetic judgments and express their artistic opinions in oral and

written form. Students will be able to 1. Reflect about various connections between art, culture, and history 2. Examine the diverse modes of expression of different periods, cultures and individual artists. 3. Investigate the value and meaning of art for contemporary times.

Museum visits are included in this course. Their purpose is not only to give the students an opportunity to see original art from the period discussed in class but also to reflect upon museum practices and their role in preserving, displaying, and defining the narrative of art history.
