- Address writing as a process of human interaction
- Prepare the student for college level writing.

## **Explanation for A-2**:

Students in this course will be developing skills in journalism, learning how to effectively communicate information to others. They will necessarily interpret interactions in the local community and present their analysis in a logical form to educate the public about community events and situations. Students will learn different genres of journalistic writing and will consider rhetorical devices and perspectives in their presentations. This writing should prepare them to consider such issues on a deeper level in other college classes.
