3. Justification and Learning Objectives for the Course. (Indicate whether required or elective, and whether it meets University Writing, and/or Language requirements) [Use as much space as necessary] Justification:

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This upper division general education course is open to both art majors and non-majors.

The topic of the course covers a wide range of issues related to art across time and cultures. This course will offer art students more choices for their upper division art history courses required for graduation. These requirements are: a minimum of two (6 units) upper division art history courses for the studio option and a minimum of 6 courses (18units) upper division art history courses for the art history option. The course will also provide other students with additional courses for their GE and elective requirements.

This course will explore the meaning of diversity in the visual arts. The cross-cultural and cross-chronological examples will address stylistic and conceptual changes within the specificity of various traditions as well as in connection with the global artistic arena. To better address these complex issues the course will focus on several themes: 1. Nature and environment; 2. Spirituality; 3. The individual; 4. Technology; 5. History; and 6. Contemporary events and everyday life. The course will comprehensively address each theme and critically analyze how artists in various cultures and different times periods have reflected about them in visual and theoretical terms. In addition, the lectures will discuss the way in which various works of art were perceived in their original context and compare to the way they are now exhibited and reproduced. This course will allow students to learn about the arts in a comparative cross-cultural and cross-chronological manner, which will reinforce the value of understanding the meaning and value of different artistic traditions. The course will include field trips to local museums, galleries and artists' studios to allow students to further reflect about the meaning of art and the complex and continuous dialogues between artistic traditions across time and cultures. Moreover, the class discussions, visual presentations, on-line activities, readings and museum visits will encourage students to explore and reflect upon novel modes in which art has been disseminated and evaluated. The essential objective of the course is to allow students to develop personal aesthetic judgments and effectively express their artistic opinions in oral and written form.

Activity

o Define and compare the role of diversity and multiculturalism in the arts.

o Evaluate the role and value of visual thinking and creativity in a global culture.

o Describe, understand, and analyze the links between various art forms, the humanities, and contemporary technologies.

o Critically analyze and interpret the meaning of images within the complex contemporary global environment.

- o Decipher and explain the cultural meanings of a wide range of works of art and signs.
- o Identify and outline new strategies of looking and thinking about art across cultures and time periods

o Interpret the specificity of their identity as contemporary individuals

o Critically compare visual and cognitive modalities of understanding other cultures

o Explain and communicate effectively their original point of view and articulate their opinions in oral and written and written form.

o Evaluate the ways in which cultural diversity influences the creation and development of various art forms and artistic directions.

Students will learn about the role of diversity and multiculturalism in the arts.

Students will critically analyze the meaning of images within the complex contemporary global visual environment.

Field trips to museums, galleries and local artists' studios will give the students the opportunity to better understand the complex diversity of the arts at the local level and compare it to the wider global artistic arena.

The content of the course, activities and assignments will enable students to develop visual and cognitive modalities of understanding other cultures and develop strategies for new ways of looking and thinking about art across cultures and time.

Upper Division Interdisciplinary

• Include substantive written work* consisting of in-class writing as well as outside class writing of revised prose.

Students will be exposed to a wide range of disciplinary perspectives in the humanities (history, art, museum studies, new media) which will help them develop an original point of view articulated in oral and written and written form.

From the perspective of various disciplines (art history, cultural studies, new media, museum studies, etc.) students will develop the skills to analyze the modalities of creating symbols and meanings in various cultures.

Students will examine from various perspectives the role of art and visuality in various cultures.

The course will include: short essays with assigned topics, term papers, reflective essays and reading and museum reports.
