ART 621 fulfills graduate level studio art credits and serves to provide the stimuli and studio environment needed to create art of this nature.

- Produce projects that express personal ideas and formulate artistic statements.

- Participate in group discussions and peer reviews (critiques) of artworks produced in class.
- Produce and present individual works of art with an advanced approach.
- Document the work made during the semester and produce a portfolio based upon this documentation.
