This upper-division art history course offers students an in-depth and cross-cultural introduction to the visual art and architecture of the global ancient world, from the Fertile Crescent and Mediterranean world of pre-Classical and Classical Antiquity (Mesopotamia, Egypt, Greece and the Aegean, Etruria and Rome) to Asia and the Americas. The course will emphasize the diversity of responses to basic problems in the development of architectural forms for civic, religious, and domestic purposes and in the development of modes of visual representation, narrative, and writing; attention will be paid to the role of materials, landscapes, and social and cultural systems in the creation and deployment of artistic canons.

This course fills a crucial slot in the art history program, offers art majors richer options in fulfilling their major requirements, and provides other students with an upper division GE and elective opportunity. This course will enable and challenge students to acquire knowledge in art history, archaeology, history, classical studies, landscape studies, and allied fields; to think critically about subjective and objective responses to works of art; to learn key ideas, issues, and methods within art history, visual culture, and related fields; and to apply interdisciplinary knowledge and methods to the interpretation of historical works of art and architecture. Students will also reflect on the roles of global antiquity in the contemporary world.
