In this course, students will learn about the way that a very specific healthcare-provider it patient relationship is enacted within the institutional setting of a hospital or healthcare agency.

Focus on how a social science discipline conceives and studies human existence

Furthermore, students will learn about the way that media messages about health issues, such as breast cancer, smoking, alcohol and drug-use impact local groups and individuals.

Address issues using the methods commonly employed by a social science discipline

Students will analyze health messages in a written paper that accompanies a debate about the way that economic or political systems impact educational messages about health.

• Emphasize interdisciplinarity by integrating content, ideas, and approaches from two or more disciplines

In this course, material from biology and medicine will be used to inform students about health communication issues. The issues themselves stem from our talk or writing about health. Several case examples of interactants who are variously equipped with medical jargon of the body, illness, and remedies when engaged in discussions or public campaigns will be used to illustrate the integration of the disciplines.

• Include substantive written work consisting of in-class writing as well as outside class writing of revised prose. Examples of appropriate written work include: short papers, long papers, term papers, lab reports, documentation, disciplinary-based letters and memos, and essays.

By writing 3-4 position papers, students will explain the way that any health issue incorporates information from biology or medicine. Based on these papers, students will then engage in debates with their peers about the issues. Students will also practice conflict resolution through group exercises. They will complete a final term paper based on an analysis of a current health issue and by using a communication perspective, will advance a solution (for conflict resolution, advocacy, or information dissemination).
