This interdisciplinary course looks at literary representations of cross-cultural and intercultural communication, using a literary/cultural studies (humanities) methodology, and looks at cross-cultural and intercultural communication situations and case studies using a Communication (social science) methodology. Bringing these two disciplines together will enable students to develop a powerful set of tools for evaluating and analysing communication situations in which race, ethnicity, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, class, and other factors play a role.

Learning objectives:

Students in this course will:

- 1. Read critically and analyze literary texts
- 2. Express their interpretations of literary texts in oral and written form
- 3. Articulate the options and alternatives for action in a wide variety of interpersonal situations.
- 4. Compare individual preferences and articulate an increased appreciation for the differences of others.
- 5. Explain the dialectical tensions that arise as students use communication to satisfy conflicting personal needs.
- 6. Explain how the process of perception affects communication behavior.
- 7. Explain the ethical dimensions of interpersonal communication.
- 8. Explain the importance of nonverbal communication in successful interpersonal interactions.
- 9. Compare defensive and supportive communication climates.
- 10. Assess the appropriateness and effectiveness of interpersonal strategies used in various interpersonal relationships.
- 11. Explain conflict in interpersonal communication and the apply conflict management principles.
