In addition, the student may choose to pursue an emphasis in Creative Writing, Multicultural Literature, English Education Preparation, or a certificate in Technical Writing. English Majors keep a portfolio of work that is reviewed by instructors as a prerequisite to the Capstone course and culminating work for the degree.

### **SUMMARY OF CHANGES**

- 1. Renumbered English 420 to English 360. Reordered 360 sequentially.
- 2. Removed English 310 from the English BA required courses. Changed units accordingly. Also removed English 310 from the English minor. Reduced required upper division units in the major by 3; increased university electives by 3 to account for 120 total units.
- 3. Added language to the English Education emphasis to state explicitly that the 6 units of required electives are incorporated into the emphasis and that no additional electives are required.
- 4. Moved advising requirement statement up in the paragraph.

### **JUSTIFICATION**

- 1. Renumbering of English 420 to English 360 formalizes the course modification of this change submitted to curriculum.
- 2. English 310 has been removed as a requirement for the English BA and minor because its content (research and library skills) has been subsumed into English 330, Interdisciplinary writing. Students and instructors report that the course is now redundant.
- 3. Admissions and records requested that we add this language to the English Education emphasis. Without this explicit statement, they hold students' files in the English Education emphasis and require them to take an additional 6 units for electives. (The emphasis was designed to prescribe particular electives for students that satisfy the subject matter requirements for the state of California. It therefore incorporates the 6 units of required electives within it and no additional electives are needed.)
- 4. Recently students have indicated that they have seen advising as English Education emphasis students but were not told to see their English advisor as required by the state. Moving up the placement of that requirement in the text may help to increase recognition.
