SUMMARY OF CHANGES

We have changed the description of Eng. 465, The Creative Writing Project, the description of the Creative Writing Emphasis, and the course # of 360 to 260, "Perspectives in Creative Writing" along with an edit –for concision – of that course. We have changed the # of the Prerequisite course from 360 to 260 for Engl. 461, 462, and 464 to correspond to these changes.

JUSTIFICATION

Since we changed the nature of "The Creative Writing Project" to fit the way the course has evolved into a student production of the CSUCI literary magazine, the course needs a new description and indication of its new content and the Creative Writing Emphasis needs to reflect this new description as well. The prerequisite is changed because English 449 is, in our present catalogue, a mistake. It refers to English 460, "Perspectives in Creative Writing," which has subsequently been changed to 360, and is NOW, with the new program proposal and course modification, being changed to 260. We have done that to better reflect the preliminary spirit of this course as it is a prerequisite to all other creative writing courses. We're hoping this will encourage students to take the course in the fall of their junior year if they want to declare a creative writing emphasis. We changed the description of Eng. 260 just for concision's sake, to make the catalogue read better. And then we changed the # of the prerequisite course for Engl 461, 462, and 464 so they correctly reflect the new number of our "Perspectives" course.
