## Criteria Justifications

• Promote understanding of how the issues relevant to social, political, contemporary/historical, economic, educational or psychological realities interact with each other within the realm of human experience

Students taking this course will be better able to understand the physical environment and critically examine how it relates to human history, cultural differences, and general human activities. They will gain a perspective of a multicultural world through a geographic perspective.

• Focus on how a social science discipline conceives and studies human existence

This course will focus on how geography views cultural and historical events. Geography looks at the world through a lens of place, space, and scale. These physical as well as temporal views are different than other social sciences view of human existence. Together with other social science discipline, geography will give CSUCI students a well-rounded view of their world.

• Address issues using the methods commonly employed by a social science discipline

Will address both cultural similarities and differences and historical human activities through the analysis of the physical environment (soil, climate, vegetation, natural resource location, topography). Will attempt to better understand differences in economic, social and political developments through a focus on spatial variations and/or physical environment. Will use the geographic analysis of place, space, and scale to provide students a broader perspective of the world they inhabit.
