- 8. Analyze the regional and hegemonic development of California's railroads and their impact on the state's economies.

- 10. Compare California's progressive movement to that of the nation at large.
- 11. Consider the defining characteristics of California gubernatorial administrations under the governments of Mexico and the United States.
