

SUMMARY OF CHANGES

Addition of two Latin American and two African courses to the options for fulfilling the upperdivision requirement in World History. HIST 360, 361, 451 and 452 were approved by CC and GE HIST 330 is cross-listed with CHEM 330 and was approved in Fall 2006.

HIST 330 replaces the old HIST 410 in the history program requirements for World History or for Thematic History.

HIST 350 has a name change and is now a Title V course, both changes already approved.

HIST 401 is an existing course, but now is being added as an option for the Upper Division North America requirement.

HIST 342 is the correct designation for Environmental History, not 347.

Moving the summary of the degree requirements to the top instead of the bottom of the program. Addition of "History Electives" section.

JUSTIFICATION

The Latin American and African history courses reflect new tenure-track hires (Marie François and Jim Meriwether).

The science course is an interdisciplinary course that replaces HIST 410 in the Thematic History offerings of the History program.

Course number, requirement options, and elective clarifications, as well as the relocation of the degree summary information, reflect an update of the curriculum to reflect changes already done or to correct information listed in error.
