Justification: This course is required for Dance emphasis students, and it is an elective for Music and Theatre emphasis students. This course will focus on the development of the necessary skills for ensemble performance in ballet, modern, jazz, historic, or other forms of theatrical dance, a necessary component of musical theatre.
