3. Justification and Learning Objectives for the Course.

This course is proposed as a lower division General Education course that meets Area C requirements. It exposes students to great works of the human imagination and gives them the tools that enable them to understand and appreciate classical music.

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- A. Demonstrate in writing their understanding of music as an art form
- B. Compare the musical styles of the major periods in music: Baroque, Classical, Romantic, Impressionist, Modern
- C. Analyze their subjective and objective responses to a given piece of music
- D. Discuss in writing the characteristics of the music of the major composers
- E. Speak and write about classical music as an expressive art form
- F. Identify generally the period of a work of music not previously encountered
- G. Write intelligently about a classical music concert they had recently attended
- H. Articulate their understanding of the difference between classical music and popular music
- I. Discuss the way classical music is related to historical, political, economic and cultural events
- J. Demonstrate in writing their ability to make judgments about the quality of a piece of music
- K. Speak knowledgeably about several of the most important classical masterpieces of the past and present

CATEGORY C: ART, LITERATURE, LANGUAGES & CULTURES

<u>Criterion</u>: Develop students' ability to respond subjectively as well as objectively to experience

<u>Response</u>: Students will be guided by the instructor and the text regarding ways to experience "art" music. Through lectures, group discussions, and in-class writing, students will have the opportunity to reflect on their responses to what they hear, both subjectively and objectively.

<u>Criterion</u>: Cultivate and refine students' affective, cognitive, and physical faculties through studying great works of the human imagination

<u>Response</u>: Students will have numerous opportunities to practice writing and speaking about their affective responses to the music encountered in class. The cognitive aspects of classical music (form, melody, harmony, timbre, rhythm, etc.) will be explained prior to asking them reflect on those. Tactile and aural senses will be refined through repeated listening and examining in class the major instruments of the orchestra.

<u>Criterion</u>: Increase awareness and appreciation in the traditional humanistic disciplines such as art, dance, drama, literature, and music

<u>Response</u>: Students will learn that music is one of the major art forms of human experience. It will make them aware of the most influential and significant musical masterpieces of the past and present. They will see how the human imagination can create works of great beauty and power through music.

Criterion: Examine the interrelationship between the creative arts, the humanities, and self

<u>Response</u>: Students will learn about the nature of music in general as an art form and its relationship to the general area of the humanities. Through lectures, demonstrations, and written assignments, they will encounter ways in which music is an expression of individuals in time, with references to similar works in the visual arts, literature, dance, and theatre.

Criterion: Include an exposure to world cultures

<u>Response</u>: The course concludes with several units on jazz and world music. The jazz unit will include the study of the music of West Africa, while the world music units will include the study of the classical music of countries such as China, Japan, Iran, Egypt, India, and Indonesia.

CATEGORY C-1: ART COURSES

Criterion: Impart knowledge and appreciation of the visual and performing arts

<u>Response</u>: Students will gain knowledge and appreciation of the performing arts (music) through assigned readings, lectures, demonstrations, films and videos, audio recordings, attendance at live concerts, and class discussions.

Criterion: Promote students' ability to effectively analyze and respond to works of human imagination

<u>Response</u>: Under the guidance of the instructor, students will learn to analyze not only the general structures and forms of works of classical music, but will learn to analyze their responses to those works, as well. They will be asked in class to reflect in writing not only the character of their subjective and objective responses, but to reflect on why they respond in the way they do.
