This course is required for Music emphasis students and is an elective for students in the Dance and Theatre emphases. In order to understand their role in society as performing/creating musicians, students should have a strong sense of connection with the past and the present in terms of aesthetic forces larger than themselves. This course will provide them with a thorough understanding of the role of musical creators and performers in society, the way in which music and culture can influence each other, and will help provide them with a sense of purpose--an understanding of the value of their work to society in general. Learning Objectives:

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

Discuss in writing the characteristics of each musical period.Write accurately about the contributions of the major composers of each musical period.

• Discuss the ways in which the stylistic musical characteristics of each major musical period influenced the next.

• Explain in writing how socio/economic forces influence musical styles and performance practices.

• Describe the characteristics of and functional differences between sacred music, classical music, folk music, and popular music.

• Explain the ways in which popular and commercial music of today may or may not be extensions of previous musical styles.

• Discuss in writing the role of popular and commercial music in America today and what the future may hold for such.

NEW

This course is a required course for PAMU, a PA elective course that will give students an overview of the history of music, including not only formal compositions but also other forms of music. It will also cultivate a multicultural awareness at both national and international levels. This course meets the University Writing Requirement
