# Request for PA 338: Theatre in History to be added to GE Category C1: Art.

Committee Response: Approved by committee on 11-28-2007

Criteria and Justifications Submitted:

- Develop students' ability to respond subjectively as well as objectively to experience
- Students will research historical information based on the set theme for the course using appropriate texts and archival information. They will then compare the treatment of these historical events in the plays, films, operas, and performance pieces they study. For their analyses students will discuss historical narratives and theoretical paradigms, and consider them in light of their own personal perspectives. Each student will be encouraged to develop their own individual viewpoints.
- Cultivate and refine students' affective, cognitive, and physical faculties through studying great works of the human imagination

The material studied by students will include plays, films, operas, and performance pieces to develop aesthetic awareness. The works will be of a visual and verbal nature, and students will have the opportunity to research and present oral presentations, and also enact scenes and stage historical episodes.

• Increase awareness and appreciation in the traditional humanistic disciplines such as art, dance, drama, literature, and music

The focus of this course is the analysis of historical subjects by studying how they are treated in the different forms of the performing arts (drama, dance, and music), as well as dramatic literature and performance texts. Students will view staged productions and read relevant critical and theoretical literature.

- *Examine the interrelationship between the creative arts, the humanities, and self* This course connects the performing arts (plays, operas, films, and performance pieces) with historical literature through analysis, discussion and research. Students will have the opportunity to contextualize the historical events against their own personal experiences and observations. They will also invest their own opinions in the discussions on the dramatic literature and performance texts.
- *Include an exposure to world cultures* In this course students will be developing an understanding of world perspectives by reading texts from different cultures in English and in translation, hearing the texts spoken in the original language by native-speakers, viewing films in the original language with English sub-titles, and investigating performance traditions from other cultures.
- *Impart knowledge and appreciation of the visual and performing arts* The very nature of this course is to consider and study the performing arts, especially theatre, in performance and production. The visual elements will be discussed both in the texts studied in the course, and the productions viewed. Theatre as spectacle will be one of the issues discussed.
- *Promote students' ability to effectively analyze and respond to works of human imagination* In addition to reading and discussing the primary works, students will be provided with secondary materials, such as theoretical and critical references, for their use. Students will also develop their own personal reactions. To better understand the plays and performance texts, students will be able to enact selected scenes themselves. Opportunities will be created for the students to write, speak, and stage their responses.

## Request for PA 338: Theatre in History to be added to GE Category C3b: Multicultural.

Criteria and Justifications Submitted:

- *Develop students' ability to respond subjectively as well as objectively to experience* Students will research historical information and evaluate the treatment of historical events in the plays, films, operas, and performance pieces they study. For their analysis they will use archival data, theoretical paradigms, and personal perspectives.
- *Cultivate and refine students' affective, cognitive, and physical faculties through studying great works of the human imagination* The material studied by students will include plays, films, operas, and performance pieces to develop their aesthetic awareness.
- Increase awareness and appreciation in the tradition humanistic disciplines such as art, dance, drama, literature, and music.

The focus of this course is the analysis of historical subjects by studying how they are treated in the different forms of the performing arts and literature.

- *Examine the interrelationship between the creative arts, the humanities, and self* This course connects the performing arts with historical literature and with personal reactions.
- Include an exposure to world cultures In this course students will be developing an understanding of world perspectives by reading texts from different cultures in translation, hearing the literature spoken in the original language, viewing films in the original language with English sub-titles, and investigating performance traditions from other cultures.
- Expose students to other cultures by addressing issues, "ways of knowing" and perspectives from at least two cultures. Must address contemporary issues. A culture is broadly defined to include aspected of ethnicity, class, gender, ability/disability, and community.

For this course the drama will be contextualized in actual historical events. Various perspectives relating to ethnicity, social class, gender, etc. will be addressed. For example, a play will be studied about the French Revolution. The ways in which this revolution was related to social class, the roles played by women, the impact this revolution had on future political developments in other countries, the ways it impacted the theatre community in France, the influences the author had on other literature, the different ways this subject was treated by contemporary directors of either American or European ethnicity, etc. will be among the perspectives addressed in this class.

### <u>Request for PA 338: Theatre in History to be added to GE Category UDIGE: Upper Division</u> <u>Interdisciplinary GE.</u>

Committee Response: Approved by committee on 11-07-2007

Criteria and Justifications Submitted:

• *Emphasize interdisciplinarity by integrating content, ideas, and approaches from two or more disciplines* 

This is a cross-listed course with History. Historical events will provide a context for the plays, film, opera, and performance pieces. The ways in which the plays and staged-productions create a variety of perspectives on the historical event will be considered. Also, ways in which the historical events shaped the aesthetic choices employed by the playwright(s) will also be discussed.

Include substantive written work consisting of in-class writing as well as outside class writing of revised prose. Examples of appropriate written work include: short papers, long papers, term papers, lab reports, documentation, disciplinary-based letters and memos, and essays.
 As part of their assessment students will have to research critical and historical prose to write a comprehensive term paper. Mid-term and Final exams will include short and long essays. Students will also write personal responses to the plays, films, operas, and performance pieces studied in class.
