TH 412 Drama of Ancient Greece (3)

Three hours lecture/discussion per week

Prerequisite: ENGL 103, 105 or equivalent and one upper division literature course.

A survey of ancient Greek drama and the culture/society that produced it. Study of the drama of ancient Greece as literature language, context, form and style—as well as the ways in which these elements work as parts of a whole which includes spoken speech and other sounds as well as physical form and movement. The course will examine a representative sample of the major plays of the tragedians Aeschylus, Sophocles and Euripides, as well as the comic playwright Aristophanes. Among the topics considered will be: the tragic and comic festivals, tragedy's relationship with Athenian democracy, the nature of Greek theaters and ancient theatrical production techniques, religion and drama, women and tragedy, tragic and comic heroism, myth and tragedy, and the legacy of Greek tragedy in the modern world. Cross-listed with ENGL 412.

Students will learn to appreciate Greek tragedy as an art form, as a social product and as an outlook.
