- 2. Describe and compare the differing psychoanalytic perspectives such as classical psychoanalysis, ego psychology, object relations theory and self-psychology.
- 3. Use psychoanalytic concepts to describe individual development.
- 4. Employ psychoanalytic concepts to describe healthy and abnormal personality functioning.
