Field Experience in Sociology is an elective activity course for advanced students of sociology who wish to apply research and observational skills in an applied, field setting. The course combines an applied experience or internship with appropriate directed readings and analysis of the site. The prerequisites for the course indicate that students must have completed their research methods courses prior to enrolling. In most cases, in sociology, placement will also involve service learning, that is, the student will be expected to provide a tangible report, assessment, or service to the agency supervisor.

The learning objectives include but are not limited to the following:

- (1) Students will be able to apply quantitative or qualitative research skills in an agency or community placement setting.
- (2) Students will be able to analyze existing social issues, structures, and/or organizations throughout the semester-long experience.
- (3) Students will develop learning contract with the instructor and site supervisor that expressly stipulates expectations in the field and for the academic component of the course.
- (4) Students will write about the experience in a culminating academic paper, or series of papers in a portfolio, that incorporates current scholarship as well as the student's examination of his/her own site.

### 5. Course Content in Outline Form. [Be as brief as possible, but use as much space as necessary]

Field Experience in Sociology is planned as an agency placement internship activity, with regularly scheduled meetings between the supervising instructor, the student or students, and their agency supervisor. The purpose of the in-class meetings would be to ensure that the student is making the connection between field work and scholarship. This class, then, is designed to fulfill a service learning component in the Sociology curriculum at the point of study where the student is most likely to benefit. Students (with help from faculty) will be expected to make contact with agencies.

(I) Field placement of students. Discussion of instructor and site supervisor expectations, research ethics, and sociological practice. First two weeks.

(II) On-Site weekly work. Periodic meetings in an arranged classroom setting with all students completing a field experience; individual meetings with their field supervisors. Periodic discussion of student site notes and presentations in a weekly classroom setting. Weeks three to fourteen.

(III) Classroom presentation of student portfolios or final projects.
