Students will be evaluated on the quality of the Spanish used, as well as on cultural content. This course fulfills the C-3a Language category in that Spanish is the medium through which cultural information and experiences are shared.

•demonstrate (orally and in writing) knowledge of basic geography and demographic information about the Spanish-speaking world

•describe, ask and answer questions related to classmate's names and places of origin, daily routines, and family

•examine changing family size and life expectancy in the U.S. and in several Spanish-speaking countries
