Justification: This course provides an additional elective for Sociology and for Spanish majors. The course is taught in Spanish with sociological content. For students of Spanish, understanding more about the society and culture of Spain is an integral part of the major. For Sociology students, Spain offers an intriguing case of rapid social change both in terms of its rapid transition to democracy and changes in social mores and values. It offers the numerous heritage speakers of Spanish in the discipline of sociology an opportunity to write, read and converse in Spanish in their major area of study. Additionally, the class is a prerequisite for study in Spain through CSUCI.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- (1) Place Spain in the context of a modern European Union nation, including its history over the past 60
- (2) Use sociological concepts to analyze various social issues in Spain having to do with modernization and social change in the period since 1975: particularly issues of immigration, gender and sexuality, religion, popular culture, and other domains;
- (3) Apply theories of social change;
- (4) Develop comparisons of differences and similarities between Spain and the United States as demonstrated in a term project;
- (5) Read, speak and write in improved Spanish language comprehension skills.
