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Requirements for the Major in Spanish (34 units)

Spanish majors will have completed the equivalent of first year college level Spanish in high school, at a community college, or by completing SPAN 101 and SPAN 102 at CSUCI, prior to beginning the Spanish major.

Students with intermediate high language proficiency may begin the major by taking upperdivision courses. Student proficiency will be determined according to the proficiency guidelines developed by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages, and will be assessed by the Spanish faculty. For these students, a total of 34 units of upperdivision courses are required to complete the Spanish major.

All Spanish majors must complete at least 11 units of 400-level courses with a SPAN prefix.

Requirements for the Certificate in Spanish Translation (21 units)

The goal of this certificate is to prepare students to work as professional translators able to translate general, specialized and literary texts from English to Spanish and vice-versa. The Certificate program is open to all students with an intermediate to high level of proficiency in Spanish. Students must successfully complete (with a grade of B or better) five required courses. Topics to be covered by coursework in the Certificate Program include translation theory, translation techniques and strategies, information literacy, and translation of general, specialized and literary texts. Courses can be taken in any order with the exception of SPAN 420 and SPAN 450, for which SPAN 320 is a prerequisite.

SUMMARY OF CHANGES

- •Addition of a Certificate in Spanish Translation.
- •Addition of two new courses: SPAN 350 Advanced Spanish Grammar and Composition and SPAN 450 Literary Translation. Both courses are required for the Certificate in Spanish Translation, and are electives for the Spanish major or minor.
- •Moving SPAN 315 Introduction to Spanish Linguistics from an elective to a required course in the core for the major.
- •With the inclusion of SPAN 315 as a required course for the major, the addition of a new student learning outcome regarding linguistics.
- •The core requirements increase from 11 units to 14 units.
- •The elective requirements decrease from 15 units to 12 units.

JUSTIFICATION

•Great interest has been expressed by students for a Certificate in Spanish Translation. Interest in translation skills has been expressed by regional agencies and business, and many students completing the SPAN 499 Capstone choose translation for their capstone project. In addition, whenever SPAN 320 Introduction to Spanish Translation has been offered, it fills with 25-30 students with some students turned away. This certificate would require 5 courses, of which two are new: SPAN 350 Advanced Spanish Grammar and Composition and SPAN 450 Literary Translation. Both courses will be listed as requirements for the Certificate as well as electives counting toward the B.A. and Minor in Spanish.

•Although the study of grammar as well as student writing are part of almost all Spanish courses, no upper-division course focuses exclusively on the study of grammar and the development of writing for writing's sake. SPAN 301 Advanced Spanish: Part One and 302 Advanced Spanish: Part Two are both language and culture courses. The creation of SPAN 350 Advanced Spanish Grammar and Composition fills a void and its creation is in response to the requests of numerous Spanish majors and minors for a course that focuses on traditional grammar and writing. The course is now being offered this Fall 2009 semester as SPAN 490 Special Topics, and the response has been enthusiastic.

•SPAN 315 Introduction to Spanish Linguistics needs to be part of the core of the requirements for the B.A. in Spanish. All students need to develop basic linguistic knowledge about the Spanish language, such as its historical development and the dialectal variation in the Spanish-speaking world.

•The addition of a program learning outcome that addresses basic linguistic issues. This program learning outcome is in response to making SPAN 315 Introduction to Spanish Linguistics a required course for all Spanish majors.
