

Graphic design courses are integral to any comprehensive art curricula. Virtually every art program throughout the world offers a course of this nature. This course is an articulated (CAN) course with neighboring colleges and universities. It provides artistic preparation for CSUCI students desiring to pursue a career in the commercial arts.
