A. Justification: The majority of CI students have seen the California Channel Islands on clear days, however they are unaware that the natural and cultural resources of the Channel Islands are essential to our local biodiversity and identity and are internationally renowned and studied. The resource management strategies that have been developed and implemented across the islands represent novel and successfully methods that have been replicated around the world and saved species on the brink of extinction. This course will provide an in depth summary of the natural and cultural history of the California Channel Islands and enable students to identify the current threats and future management needs. The overall objective of the course is to create a new cohort of local environmental stewards by teaching the students how the interactions between geology, geography, climatology, and human history determine the ecological integrity and health of the land they inhabit.


