1. Promote understanding of how the issues relevant to social, political, contemporary/historical, economic, educational or psychological realities interact with each other within the realm of human experience

The course explores the impact of the modern surveillance society on political power, social norms, disciplinary practices and behavior and identity formation. In this way, we will see how social, political, educational, contemporary, and psychological realities interact within our current experiences.

2. Focus on how a social science discipline conceives and studies human existence

We will utilize multiple approaches to addressing the core issue so that students will be exposed to - and engage in - different social science research methods used to understand, explain and predict human behavior as well as the formation and maintenance of social and political systems.

3. Address issues using the methods commonly employed by a social science discipline

The students will be doing their own research using social science research methods. While the course focuses on the issue of surveillance (both big brother and big business), the students will research and analyze a current related topic of their own choosing.

1. Emphasize interdisciplinarity by integrating content, ideas, and approaches from two or more disciplines

This course will be team taught by faculty members in English and Political Science. Material, approaches, content, and research methods will draw from both of those disciplines as well as sociology and psychology.

2. Include substantive written work consisting of in-class writing as well as outside class writing of revised prose. Examples of appropriate written work include: short papers, long papers, term papers, lab reports, documentation, disciplinary-based letters and memos, and essays.

Students will have in-class writing and reflection pieces, two short analytical papers (one using literary analysis, the other political theory) and a long research paper utilizing social science research methods.
